

# Music Spotlight: Anthem at the Offering



The composer of today's anthem, Samuel Coleridge-Taylor, was an English composer of mixed race, born to an English woman and a Sierra Leone Creole father. He was very highly regarded by his nineteenth-century contemporaries, likened to Gustav Mahler. "Lift Up Your Heads" is a setting of the popular text from Psalm 24, used to help us prepare for Christ's coming. Listen to how the opening melody ascends, its "lifting" mirroring that of the gates; then, different groups in the choir work in dialogue to complete the text.

# Nominees for Elder—Three-Year Term

Brian Burke resides in Narberth with his wife Molly and children Marshall (22), Mary (19), and Bo (6). He has been a member of Overbrook Presbyterian since February 2022. He works at Fox Chase Cancer Center - Temple Health, where he is the Practice Administrator for the Department of Surgical Oncology

Karen Testa joined OPC in 2012 shortly after moving from Massachusetts with her family. She felt drawn to OPC after church shopping for a faith community that was diverse, was welcoming, and offered opportunities for her school-aged children. She has served two prior terms on Session and helped to start a Communications Task Force to better understand the communications needs of the congregation and offer recommendations to keep everyone informed and engaged. Karen loves to host Fellowship Hour and serves on the Congregational Life and Women's Dining Circle Committees. She is also past co-chair of Stewardship and recently served on the committee considering a capital fundraising campaign to support the church. Outside of church, Karen is a lifelong communications professional, working as a journalist for The Associated Press for 25 years before moving to consulting in 2019. She serves on the board of Teachers' Teammates and loves her weekly running group and spin classes. She is also missing her two kids, who live in the Pacific Northwest: Zack, 22, a senior at the University of Oregon and a former OPC deacon, and Amber, 19, a sophomore at Washington State University and proud OPC pasta cook on Christmas Eve.

# Nominees for Elder—Second Consecutive Three-Year Term

Christoph Von Andreae was born and raised on an organic farm in Aachen, Germany; his journey has always been rooted in care and connection. After earning his medical degree in Berlin, Christoph relocated to Philadelphia in 2003 to complete his psychiatric training at Drexel University and the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia (CHOP). Now a dedicated psychiatrist, Christoph works with children, adolescents, and adults in both West Philadelphia and Fort Washington. He lives in Wynnewood with his wife Tara, two children, and their dog Otto. Beyond his professional calling, Christoph harbors a deep commitment to sustainability and is an enthusiastic advocate for composting even offering advice on how to keep compost worms thriving in a basement. Christoph joined Overbrook Presbyterian Church in 2010 after an exploration of several congregations in the Philadelphia area. He was drawn to OPC's rich Protestant traditions, emphasizing scripture, sermon, music, and fellowship. The welcoming community at OPC, which celebrates the unique gifts of each member, provided a spiritual home for Christoph and his family. Both of his children were baptized within the OPC community. Since 2022, Christoph has served as an elder on Session. His leadership includes serving as the Session liaison to the Child & Damp; Family Ministry for the past three years and cochairing the Sanctuary Revitalization Task Force. Christoph seeks to continue his service to the OPC community for a second three-year term, further contributing to the vibrant life and mission of the church

Mimi Winkler's family came to Overbrook in the mid-'90s through the preschool, where both her children, Harry and Becca, started their education. They are now grown and currently living in Philadelphia. Harry is a computer coder, and Becca is a third-year Ph.D. student in anthropology at Penn. Mimi grew up in Rosemont and lives in Bala Cynwyd. When not working, she can be found gardening or sketching with the Urban Sketchers or her centenarian stepmother. She is an architect by profession and operates a small firm that designs a range of public and private projects, most recently completing the renovation of the 5th Street/Independence Mall subway station. She and her husband, Jim, founded the firm together in 2001; sadly, he died of cancer in 2014. Jim was passionate about the history of the church and its ongoing maintenance, and Mimi hopes to channel that passion in her service to Overbrook.

## Nominees for Deacon—Three-Year Term

Becky Lazo is the mother of Hannah and Nathan Lazo and a friend to many at Overbrook. She has been attending Overbrook since about 2008 and joined the church in 2010. This church community brings her so much joy, and she is happy to have served previously as an Elder, a Sunday School teacher, and an occasional member of the Mission & Outreach Committee. What keeps her coming to Overbrook is the love and grace we show to each other and to the rest of God's children. She is honored to have been nominated to serve our community as a Deacon

Mads Cosgriff-Piatt (he/him or they/them) began attending OPC with their family in the Summer of 2000, regularly participating in church programming until graduating from Lower Merion High School in 2013. He studied art and math at Carleton College, then spent the next five years up Providence, Rhode Island, working in clinical medical research. Mads immediately felt called to serve this Christian community and embark upon a faith journey, which drew them back the very next morning for the Martin Luther King, Jr., Day of Service in 2024. He treasures the fellowship and guidance graciously offered by Overbrook saints and feels blessed by the opportunity to provide care for our congregation.

She has had the great privilege of singing in the choir and has served on Session and various committees over the years. Zee Ann is grateful for the inspiration and grounding she has received during the worship service each Sunday. She is recently retired from her long career at the Museum of the American Revolution. She is enjoying her unscheduled life—reading, cooking, playing the piano—and is looking forward to serving as a deacon

Margene Biedermann moved to Philadelphia in 1989 to pursue a master's degree in music therapy at Temple University and met her husband Brad there. They joined Overbrook Church in 1996. They were attracted by Overbrook's excellent music program and its focus on diversity. After attending the Taste of Overbrook that autumn, Margene and Brad knew they were Overbrook lifers! Soon after joining, Margene became a deacon and later served as the Deacon Moderator for five years. Over decades, she has witnessed the valuable service that the deacons provide.
